Stockland Lovell Manor

The 700 acre estate comprising of a beef and arable farm, has been in the Hill family since 1907 and is beautifully situated, nestling in the shadow of the Quantock Hills, with panoramic views stretching from the Mendip Hills across Bridgwater Bay to Wales. There is an excellent cross country course for schooling use. 1989 saw the beginning of equestrian activities with the building of the original cross country course.

Since then, it has developed extensively, now running over 75 acres of natural terrain providing an excellent variety of fences, both portable and permanent, including two water complexes, banks, a sunken road, steps and various ditch combinations.

The cross country facility is further complemented by two dedicated all weather arenas, one 60 x 50 metre for show jumping and an adjoining 50 x 50 metre for dressage. There are also several designated pleasure hacking routes.

On site accommodation and catering is provided for both horse and rider.

Many Riding Clubs (like BVRC), Pony Clubs and other groups regularly return to Stockland Lovell year on year. Stockland Lovell Manor has something to offer for everyone.

Riding Facilities

- Over 1.5 miles of Cross Country, including two schooling areas, two water complexes, ditches, steps and numerous obstacles.
- Fences range from 50cm 1.10m
- Showjumping all weather arena, including a full set of Jump4Joy fences
- Dressage all weather arena
- Mixed rubber & sand Arena surface
- A variety of marked routes for hacking across the farm and neighbouring land.

Rider Accommodation Facilities

- 7 Nordic Style wood cabins with verandas, perfect for evening socializing
- 2 Converted two-story Barns
 - Accommodation of various sizes, furnished and heated, containing 3-6 bunk beds, divans, mirror, chairs and hooks for clothing.
- Clean, well fitted male and female showers and toilets
- Large converted barn provides spacious dining room with kitchen facilities, and a separate TV/ Recreation area
- Saddlery Shop which stocks a full range of equipment and clothing for horse and rider

Camp Details

Arrival will be on Monday 22nd April 12-1pm and departure after lunch on Thursday 25th April.

There will be six riding sessions on offer, one on Monday afternoon, 2 each on Tuesday and Wednesday and one on Thursday morning.

The application form will ask the type (flatwork, gridwork, show jumping, cross country or hacking) and number of sessions you would like to do (not more than 2 of each jumping type, maximum of 6 sessions). We will do our best to satisfy your choice.

Bedding: Residents will need to take their own bedding including pillows.

Horse Food: Hard food will not be supplied, so we will need to take our own.

Rider Clothing:

Hats

Everyone mounted shall wear correct riding clothes, which must include 'Protective Headwear', with a harness properly adjusted and fastened. 'Protective Headwear' constitutes a hat meeting one of the following standards:

HATS with a FIXED PEAK are not permitted for XC

 A Body Protector to BETA Level 3 Blue Label (dated 2018 or after) is compulsory for Cross Country & highly recommended for Grid/Show Jumping.

From 1 Jan 2024, the BETA 2009 Purple Label will no longer be accepted.

Medical Armbands are recommended at all times when mounted.

Flu Vacc: All horse must have a current flu vaccination certificate, which may be checked on arrival.

PLEASE READ THE VACCINATION RULES BELOW AND CHECK THAT YOUR HORSE'S CERTIFICATE COMPLIES IN EVERY RESPECT.

Costs

Prices are set just to cover costs and not make a profit. Along with all other costs, charges made by SL have increased from 2023.

Facility fees are banded according to the number of attendees. The bands are 15-19 or 20+ people.

We have assumed that numbers will be similar to 2023 and have set costs on that basis. Should we exceed 20 attendees, then a refund will be paid.

Costs, based on attendance by 15-19 people, are made up as follows:

Rider and Horse

accommodation, stabling (including shavings & hay/haylage), hire of arenas & cross country course
catering (breakfast, lunch & evening meal)
instructors

£45/per day x3
£96

Total cost £492

Non-rider/helper

Accommodation £40/per day x3 catering (breakfast, lunch & evening meal) £45/per day x 3

Total cost £255

A second horse may be brought (cost includes 2 extra riding sessions).

Hence the cost this year will be £492/£255 of which a £100 deposit shall be paid on completion of the application form (no later than 22nd March). The remainder (£392/£155) will be payable on or before 5th April.

Our allocation is for 40-45 people / horses. Places will be allocated on a first come, first served basis, but applications won't exceed the SL limit.

Equine Influenza - Valid Certificates - Vaccination procedures

Each horse must have a valid vaccination certificate, which undeniably relates to that horse, completed, <u>signed and stamped</u> on each relevant line by a veterinary surgeon, who is not the owner of the animal.

From 1st **January 2024** for those **starting or re-starting** an equine influenza programme **on or after 1 January 2024** Following research, British Equestrian has issued a directive to Equestrian Organisations, including BRC, to change the primary injection course intervals. These changes are detailed in the table below.

This does NOT mean that those who have vaccinations that are current and correct need to restart.

The certificate must state that the horse has received the appropriate course of injections against Equine Influenza as follows:

| | Intervals before 1 January 2024 | Intervals from 1 January 2024 NEW COURSES or RESTARTS |
|--|---------------------------------|---|
| 1 st (Primary) Vaccination (V1) | | |
| 2 nd (Primary) Vaccination (V2) | 21 - 92 days after V1 | 21 – 60 days after V1 |
| 3 rd (First Booster) Vaccination (V3) | 150 – 215 days after V2 | 120 – 180 days after V2 |
| Annual Booster | Not more than 1 year apart | Not more than 1 year apart |

Only the first two injections need to have been given for the horse to comply.

None of the vaccinations may be given within the <u>preceding 6 days</u>, including the day of arrival.

Annual Boosters may be given on the same date each year, but this is not recommended.

If the current vaccination programme started BEFORE 1 January 5 years ago:

- the first two primary injections must be correct i.e. the second given between 21 and 92 days after the first
- any errors with first booster (which should be given 150 215 days after the second primary injection) or annual booster given BEFORE 1 January (5 years ago) may be ignored
- all annual boosters given AFTER 1 January 5 years ago must be correct

If your horse's history does not comply, then you will need to restart with primary & secondary vaccinations, remembering that the last one must be not less than a clear week before the day of camp.

To help you check your vaccinations in advance, you can use the BRC website <u>downloads</u>. A simple explanation is also given on the <u>Area 17 Website</u>.

<u>It is worth remembering:</u> There is a legal requirement for a valid passport to accompany the horse when travelling.
